You have meetings so items can be discussed and decisions made. However, an agenda setter will have a good idea of what they think the decision on each agenda item will be. So why not try and do something with that knowledge to make a meeting more efficient?

How do you judge a good meeting?

What if, as an agenda setter, you could test your predicted outcome before the meeting begins? If the attendees agree with you, they will be happy not to discuss the item and you shorten your meeting by achieving pre-meeting decisions. If they don't agree, you'll have a far better idea of the time needed at the meeting for discussion. Let's face it; what we all want from a meeting is a positive outcome to which we feel we have contributed!

So here's a second thought. How do we ensure in a meeting that everyone has participated and had their view considered, so that there is the best possible alignment behind a decision?

Decisions! Decisions!

Firstly let's look at how we might get a group of people to agree on something:

How to get the best decision?

"What I try to do in meetings is to find the people who have not spoken, who often are the ones who are afraid to speak out, but have a dissenting opinion. I get them to say what they really think and that promotes discussion, and the right thing happens." **Eric Schmidt** CEO of Google ⁽¹⁾

- (a) Get them interacting.
- (b) Have them consider some propositions.
- (c) Either signify group agreement or vote on the proposals made.

Simple in theory - but much more complicated in reality!

If we are in a room with other people not everyone will be brave enough to contribute and some may be so much braver that they dominate the meeting. 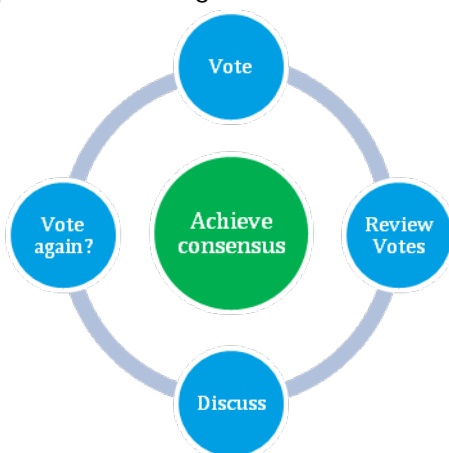

Imagine seeing the ABCD 'Who Wants to be a Millionaire' votes table and then being able to change your vote if you want to. That's how **Acord.it** uses the Delphi Process

How is the Delphi Process utilised?

- First the group ponders an issue or question then chooses a solution and makes comments anonymously.
- The solutions and comments are then reviewed, discussed and the group can then choose again on the same issue or question.
- The process of seeing the choices that others in the group have made (but crucially not seeing who has chosen what) before choosing again, either leads to a consensus being drawn together or shows decision makers how dispirit a view the group has on the issue or question.

What methods do we provide?



If your decision making group is international or based in different offices a Global [Acord](#) allows the group to access an electronic conference

portal on their own internet connected device at the time of their choosing. They work through the various propositions or issues to be decided upon using the Delphi Process explained above in an e-consensus conference.



Local [Acord](#) is for a decision making group who are in the same room. Local [Acord](#) provides for round table discussion and

decisions using the Delphi process. Because voting using [Acord.it](#) is anonymous, no undue pressure can be brought to bear so no member of the group can dominate the meeting. Finally the group will own any decisions collectively because everyone has participated in making them.



The third of our methods is Instant [Acord](#) which provides a feedback tool for conferences or large groups. It can be a comment collector, allowing
